Vermont, one town at a time

Manchester man joins '251 club'

MANCHESTER — There would be no blatting and bawling. no decisions made without a vote. and no way they would miss an opportunity to get ice cream.

Yes, this was the "Big Dogs 251 Club" and David Ouefnel and grandsons Zachary and Eric Shambo would get things their way because this was their quest to visit all 251 Vermont cities and towns.

Mulling over ways to keep active in his youthful 50s a few years ago, Quefnel joined the 251 Club, an organization with some 4,000 members whose mission is to visit every municipality in the state. He got his grandsons interested in participating and in the spring of 2001, the three armed

themselves with maps, a camera, loose leaf paper, pens and a tent and set off in Quefnel's pickup truck.

Pownal was the trio's first stop in April 2001 in what was to be a trip hundreds of miles long, stretched over many weekends and costly, thanks to the many gasoline and ice cream stops.

Last week, the group completed the journey with a sheduled get-together with Gov. James Douglas at the Statehouse in Montpelier. This Tuesday, the Manchester Select Board proclaimed Quefnel as "Honorary Manchester Ambassador to Vermont" for making the journey.

Middlebury residents Zachary Shambo, 10, and Eric Shambo, 8, said the best part of the adventure wasn't the stops at various elemen-

tary school playgrounds, covered bridges, museums, campgrounds, diners, cemeteries or even an encounter with former Red Sox picther Bill Lee.

Instead, getting to meet Douglas was their greatest thrill.

"I enjoyed seeing the governor and actually meeting him face-toface," said the freckle-faced Zachary Shambo.

The governor autographed the group's notebook with a note about the state's strength being in its rich and diverse communities.

"You have a better understanding of our beautiful state," he wrote. "Best wishes on your next adventure, Good luck,"

Ouefnel and the Shambos' nicknamed themselves the Big Dogs from a now-defunct Manchester business and occasionally
